We have 95 Groups Scouts Leaders, District Managers, Executive Committee, Appointments Committee, SASU and Network members, all providing invaluable support, knowledge and experience.


We have 132 Activity permits from archery, climbing, shooting to a variety of water disciplines and 47 Nights Away permits.

Farnham District Cubs Annual Report 2019-20

Cub Scouting in Farnham continues to thrive – most packs are operating at capacity and some have managed to take children off the waiting lists and give them the opportunity to become cubs this year.

I visited all the packs last year at some stage – all of the programmes sent to me were superb with a good mix of activities and badge work with the odd trip out thrown in too! I am always amazed by the innovative ideas that leaders come up with for their weekly sessions. This has continued throughout the lockdown and well done to all of the leaders for keeping scouting going at this difficult time.

Farnham District took 90 + cubs to Scram in June 2019 - a great time was had by all and a lot of great ideas were picked up by the leaders that went along too!

Over the summer holidays camps were held by some of the packs and I was able to go along to a few. I went to Phazels Wood to visit 3rd Farnham Cubs who picked one of the hottest spells of the summer for their camp. Simon Lomas -Clarke was running the camp to obtain his Nights Away permit and I am very happy to advise that he passed with flying colours! One of several leaders I have assessed and passed recently—our cubs are lucky that we have such committed leaders.

On 4,5 and 6th October (2019) a District Cub camp was held at Garners Field – 125 cubs came along and did lots of scouting activities at bases to earn a survival tin with fire lighting striker, whistle, compass, emergency blanket and other items in it. On the Sunday we hiked to Frensham Little Pond for a picnic lunch and the weather was glorious. The beach was fairly quiet – unlike now! My thanks go to Amanda Morgan for helping me organise and run the camp, Ann-Marie for her support, all the leaders who helped run bases, county instructors Russell and Colin who taught knots and compass/map, Chris Moss and Janet and Michael Watts, Graeme and Charlie Morgan and of course in the background and without whom I could not run the camp - my support team Davis, Danielle, Oli and Gary!

Remembrance Day Parade was well attended by the groups based in Farnham Town Centre – we seem to grow every year and it always makes me proud to see our cubs marching along and behaving so well at the War Memorial and in church afterwards.

This year has been a challenge – a lot of plans have had to be changed or cancelled. The District Cub/Beaver Camp is still planned for 2/3/4 October 2020 at the moment – I am loath to cancel it unless I really have to given so many camps haven't happened. Time will tell if we are able to go ahead!


Scouting has never been more important to our children and their families especially the venerable ones. We take a lot for granted – maybe its time to reflect on how lucky we are!

Farnham Explorer Scouts Annual Report - April 2019 - March 2020

This has been a great year for Explorer Scouting in Farnham.

We currently have around 65 young people, spread between four units. These four units are:

Scorpions - based at the 2nd HQ in Hale, meeting Mondays

K2 - based at the 5th HQ in the Bourne, meeting Wednesdays

Eiger Tigers - based at the Elstead Youth Centre, meeting Thursdays

Madcats - based at the 11th HQ on the Guildford Road Trading Estate, meeting Thursdays

Explorers is the fourth section of Scouting, following on from Scouts, and before Network. We take young people aged 14-17 and try and give them a wide variety of experiences, fun, adventure, friendship, and skills for life. This is enabled by a great team of leaders who have my heartfelt thanks for all they do. They're amazing! We're always looking for new adults to join in the fun of our leadership team.

Weekend camps

We have had three great weekends away this year. Gilwell24 - a frenetic 24 hour activity weekend with over 4500 Explorers attending. Theme Park Camp where Explorers and Network come together, go to Thorpe Park for the day and have fun discos and camp fires and play games in the evenings, and Family Camp where the Explorers camp together as a "Family" and help run activities across the camp for young people to have a go at.

Summer Camp

This year we took 40 young people to Collard Bridge campsite near Barnstaple in North Devon. Early one

Saturday morning at the start of the school summer holidays we packed a big lorry full of kit and three minibuses full of Explorers and headed off in a convoy from Farnham. Some time later we arrived and unloaded it all again. Working together and working hard we put up the District marquee as a massive store tent, kitchen, and on the off chance we got some liquid sunshine. Then we divided the Explorers into patrols, each patrol getting a dining shelter to put up and cooking gear to look after themselves for a week. Eve-

ryone then busied themselves putting up teepees for personal kit and small tents and hammocks to sleep in.

During the week we had some massive games of beach cricket, sand castle competitions, we had some superb surfing lessons that had everyone catching a wave, we biked along the Tarka Trail, including some on tandems (with varying levels of success), and went horse riding.





We also helped the National Trust with a beach clean and nurdle hunt. Finishing off the week with a stunning hike along the South West coast path to Lynmouth, fish and chips, and a ride in the funicular up to Lynton. Great teamwork on the final day, tired as everyone was, to pack everything up, convoy home, and unpack everything again.

A special mention to Carolyn and Richard Dance who for the second year came and did all the food buying and "quartermaster" duties. No mean feat with nearly 50 people on camp!

International

We had six Explorers go to the World Scout Jamboree in West Virginia USA. Safe to say they had an incredible time as part of the three Surrey Units. They started off in New York for a day or two, then went off to the Jamboree site for two weeks where there were 45000 participants from 152 countries! The campsite (Summit Bechtel Reserve) was so massive it could take 1½ hours just to walk from one part of the site to another. While there they took part in all sorts of activities like huge zip wires and long range rifle shooting and skateboarding and climbing. Then there were the huge opening and closing ceremonies with drone light displays and fireworks. There were also cultural days where they got to try cuisine and play games from all over the world. Each unit was surrounded by units from other countries and have come back with new friends from across the globe. With the trip to Canada, Niagara, and a baseball game after the actual Jamboree they were away for nearly a month. An incredible experience for them all.



We also had two Explorers who joined up with Hampshire and went to Malawi for four weeks, camping, doing community work, and going on safari. The photos were amazing, it looked like they've also had a life changing experience.

More Explorers have also been selected for EuroJam2020 in Poland and have been going to preparation camps. Unfortunately due to coronavirus this has been postponed to 2021. Still, something to look forward to!

Weekly meetings and other stuff

As usual we had an eclectic mix of evening meetings, from pancakes to deep fried custard creams to bike rides to tie dye to wide games to Dungeons and Dragons to fireball spinning to a trampoline park and a whole host of other random stuff. As well as more traditional scouty things like shooting (including a team at the Bisley National Scout Rifle Championships) archery climbing kayaking etc.

Just before lockdown over 50 of us did a Monopoly Run in London, along with over 3000 other scouts and guides from across Europe, splitting into small teams, running round London and jumping on and off tubes and buses to try and buy as many properties as possible before everyone else. Tiring but fun!


